

The measure reads: "The state shall not deny or interfere with an individual's reproductive freedom in their most intimate decisions, which includes their fundamental right to choose to have an abortion and their fundamental right to choose or refuse contraceptives." And later:

the measure is "intended to further the constitutional right to privacy ...and the constitutional right to not be denied equal protection." Both statements have been interpreted to protect abortion on demand.

The average American believes 'choice' refers to having abortions available earlier in pregnancy and for difficult circumstances, but they do NOT believe in unlimited abortion on-demand throughout pregnancy. (Gallup/Marist/ NYT) Recent California polls (Rasmussen poll of 8/11/22) indicate that California voters agree. Only 13 % want unlimited abortion throughout pregnancy. The vast majority of Californians wish to see some reasonable restrictions on abortion, and some balancing of abortion rights.
